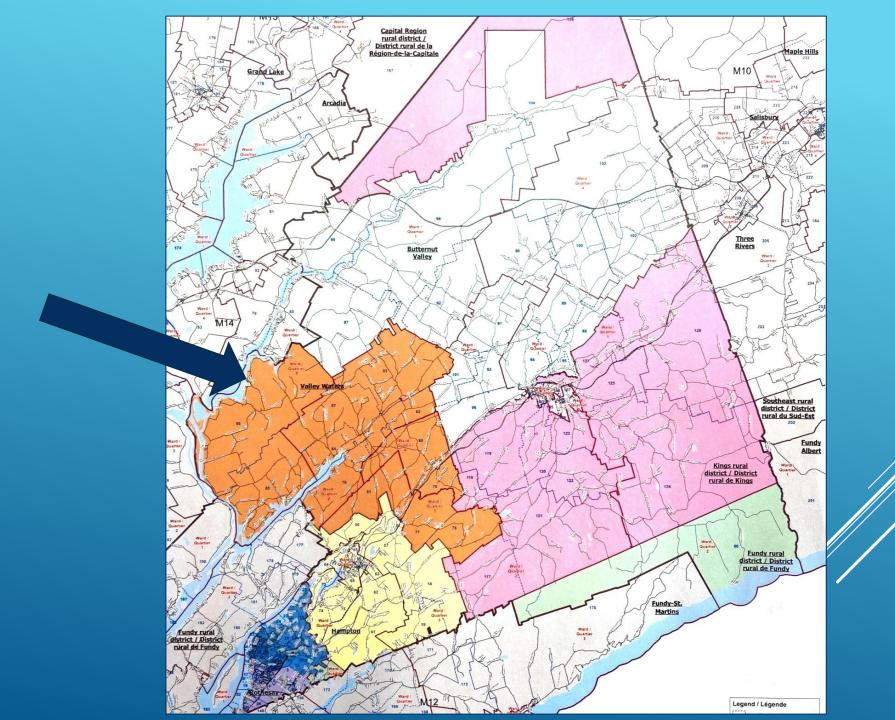
VALLEY WATERS - AN OVERVIEW

SPRING 2023



WHAT IS VALLEY WATERS?

- ► New Municipal Government created during New Brunswick Municipal Reform Process, incorporated January 01, 2023.
- Includes former Village of Norton
 Former LSD's of Springfield, Kars, Wickham, Norton Parish, Upham (partial)
- ► Population: 4549
- ► Geographic area: 726 sq. kms
- ► Road surfaces: 583 kms
- ▶ Valley Waters is legally considered a village.

WHAT HAS / HAS NOT CHANGED?

- Community names have not changed
- Mailing addresses / 911 civic addresses have not changed
- Road maintenance responsibilities have not changed (still DTI outside of Norton)
- Fire departments have not changed, but now report to Valley Waters instead of to Norton or ELG
- Solid Waste providers have not changed (Valley Waters may or may not combine contracts when current contracts expire at year end)

- Former LSD's now have representation on a Council, and input into budgets and plans
- Planning, budgets and most services now handled by Valley Waters, not by Dept.
 Environ't & Local Government
- Still have separate tax rates for each of the 6 former entities (Valley Waters Council may or may not combine some budget items in the future)
- Norton by-laws remain in effect for Norton only, until Valley Waters Council reviews them and either amends, rescinds for adopts them for all of Valley Waters
- Increased responsibility mandated for Regional Service Commission

VALLEY WATERS TAX BASE

- ► Tax base growth for Valley Waters 2021 to 2022: **8.73%** (combination of development and assessment values)
- ▶ New construction 1.28%, re-assessment 7.45%
- ► Compare this to Provincial tax base growth: 10.73%
- ▶ Total Valley Waters tax base: \$452,450,000

ROADS / TRANSPORTATION

- ► Total Valley Waters budget: \$610,793 (Note: \$984,337 DTI levy for former LSD's does not come to Valley Waters and is not included here.
- Cost to Norton (former Village): \$606,255 (99.25%) equipment, staff, patching, paving, ditching, plowing, salt & sand, street lights, etc. Not shared with other tax units.
- Additional \$1500 signage allocation
- ▶ Shared cost for RSC Regional Transportation Initiative: \$3,038
- ► Road maintenance costs for the (non-Norton) tax-units are covered by the Provincial Roads levy (\$0.4115/\$100), not included in Valley Waters budget, total \$984,337:

REGIONAL SERVICE COMMISSION SERVICES

- RSC reform has added additional requirements for municipal budgets in 2023
- Previous RSC Services: Planning, Building Inspections, Solid Waste
- Newly (2023) RSC mandated services:
 - Regional Public Safety
 - Regional Transportation
 - Social & Community Development
 - Regional Recreation Infrastructure & Development
 - Regional Economic Development
 - Regional Tourism Development

TOTAL 2023 cost (to Valley Waters) for RSC Services: **\$420,500 (Shared across tax units)**

NEXT STEPS?

 Public Engagement meetings for Council Strategic Planning Process – (spring 2023)

- Review and writing of by-laws
- Updating plans: rural plans / land use, asset management plan, emergency response plans, etc.
- Regional Service Commission committee work for mandated services (Council, staff, and community participation)

STRATEGIC PLAN WORKING SESSION

WHAT IS A STRATEGIC PLAN?

A strategic plan is a tool to help align your short-term goals with your long-term vision,

and the actions you will take to achieve them.



WHAT ARE THE STEPS?

1- Strategy formulation –

Assess the current situation and conditions - completed

Confirm your mission **(completed)** and establish a <u>vision</u> for where you want Valley Waters to be (long-term) - <u>started</u>

Establish **short-term goals** for achieving that long-term vision.

2- Strategy Implementation -

Assign responsibilities and timelines for the short-term goals;

Establish the budget / funding required to achieve the short-term goals;

Communicate the overall plan to staff and the public.

3- Strategy evaluation -

Use tools such as workplans, calendars, regular meetings and reporting, to stay on track and adjust the plan if required.

Council to create the long-term vision and short-term (3-yr) priorities / measurable goals for this Council's mandate.

Assign responsibilities (including Council and Community Committees), timelines, budgets and workplans.





Communicate the plan, execute the plan, and report on progress regularly.
